Relationships and engaging with community in person are fundamental to Kinbridge. We were all re-energized as restrictions lifted and coming together in person slowly became our way of being. We navigated the increased demands on our services with our partners. We were excited to build some new relationships along the way.

Kinbridge continues to be committed to Equity, Diversity, Inclusion (EDI), and Truth and Reconciliation (TR), learning and understanding how we need to change and truly lean into our vision. This is the backbone and foundation as we move ahead with our new strategic plan. Included in this work is a business model redevelopment to support our commitment to EDI and TR.

Technology is another area of continued learning and adaptation. Helm MSP INC continues to be instrumental in our ability to not only engage with our community and build relationships but keep us current and secure. They truly have remained committed to the purpose of our work. They learned alongside us as we navigated COVID by keeping the nuggets of learning and adapting to our work today. They are serious about security and ensure we learn the pitfalls, how to be safe, and what to watch for. Safety and risk management continues in our hybrid work.



Our volunteers are amazing. Once they could, they returned with energy and passion supporting Kinbridge, serving the community, and really creating that sense of belonging. Selflessly giving 4,525 hours of their time, caring, and compassion. Breakfast with Santa, Summer BBQs, Rodeos and Picnics, Summer Camps, Bingo, Gardens, Translating, and Tutoring would not be happening without their dedication. Our Board of Directors continued to put in extra time to keep Kinbridge's eye on the horizon, attending workshops, sitting on committees, and engaging with opportunities.

Kinbridge intentionally invests in building its capacity for offering services. Partnerships are more vital than ever. Especially ensuring that all voices are heard. We are learning how to do things differently, and how to engage and build partnerships that are value-based, strengthening our ability to listen to and share in meeting the needs of our neighbours. Our financial and human resource systems have been strengthened. We renewed our High Five Accreditation. We are updating our website to be more accessible and responsive. We are investing in staff supporting trauma-informed training, and we are investing in staff wellness. The Hallman Foundation's investment in Kinbridge with General Operating Support dollars continues to have an impact even though the successful pilot ended in December 2022.

Accessing the various local grants kept us looking at the bigger picture. We are also grateful for the City of Cambridge, Waterloo Region Community Foundation, United Way, the Region of Waterloo, Ministry of Heritage, Sport, Tourism and Culture Industries; Ministry of Children and Youth Services; Waterloo Region Immigration Partnership, and our donors in working with us to support our investments, for their help in keeping us moving forward with community.

Kinbridge has been able to continue to work with and rely on key partners supporting our ability to be nimble, proactive, and responsive in innovative ways. Together we have impacted youth and newcomer employment, children and family's well-being, older adult connections, newcomers' sense of belonging, system navigation, and access to various programs and services. Social Venture Partners worked with us to improve our "Pitch". Lastly, we are excited to grow our new partnership with Rhythm and Blues, Spectrum, and the Region Wide Tutoring Program.







The Board of Directors remain committed to their governance role, asking hard questions, conducting financial diligence, and looking deep at our own practices. They are committed to understanding and learning the necessary changes in governance to ensure that our Association continues to be a vibrant partner in Cambridge and the Region of Waterloo and that our programs and services are relevant, accountable, and of high quality. The Board along with the staff are committed to making changes, listening deeply to the community, looking inward at our own systemic injustices and biases, and being an active ally.

The unprecedented issues of homelessness, increased violence, addictions, and food security continue to be further impacted by an increasing number of people. We will continue to address these challenging issues with our neighbours and partners. We will be utilizing our own data and the larger disaggregated data to work better, developing meaningful actions. The pandemic has taught us a new way of working together.

In closing, a huge thank-you is extended to all volunteers, staff, community members, partners, and funders. We are focused on the opportunities ahead of us as we make a difference together. None of the successes that Kinbridge Community Association has achieved and will continue to achieve could happen without the dedication shown by everyone involved.



2023 HIGHLIGHTS

NEWCOMER CONNECTIONS

Kinbridge's Newcomer program offers newcomer youth (15-29) and newcomer older adults (55+) programs and services that are meant to expand their knowledge of Cambridge and increase their sense of belonging to their new surroundings. Over the past year, the program has provided newcomers with an opportunity to create a community with fellow Cambridge residents through different 8-week programs and bi-annual newcomer gatherings called Let's Be Neighbours. As a result, we have seen a consistent increase in youth and older adult participants. Kinbridge has also intentionally ensured newcomers have a voice in the type of programs we offer, which has led to the starting of a Young Mothers program. This program is still for individuals between the ages of 15-29 but for those with a completely different experience than the typical "youth," requiring programs uniquely for them. The program has been an enormous success, bringing many young newcomer mothers to Kinbridge to receive workshops on relevant information and opportunities to meet other organizations that may benefit them.

In 2023, Kinbridge expanded the newcomer program by adding a pilot newcomer employment program. Waterloo Region Immigration Partnership is funding this program and has already surpassed the anticipated numbers for the program. We are excited to see our organization and community become more diverse and to continue to meet the needs of our community.

CAMBRIDGE NEIGHBOURHOOD TABLE

Cambridge Neighbourhood Table (CNT) has officially launched! Kinbridge has partnered with Forward Church Cambridge and Cambridge Food Bank for the inaugural weekly meal on Fridays at Forward Church. The primary purpose of the CNT is community development, where everyone in the neighbourhood is invited. Using a communal dining approach, we hope to create a connected community by fostering connections in local neighbourhoods and providing space for social activities and supportive services.





YOUTHFORGE

From 2019 to 2022, YouthForce has employed 110 youth and facilitated training and workshops for over 600 youth (ages 15-29) living in the Waterloo Region. In addition, the summer teams have completed 3,822 unit inspections within subsidized and affordable housing communities and delivered over 34,000 materials for outreach and engagement initiatives. YouthForce has also conducted 880 community beautification site visits, 84 landscaping and garden projects, and facilitated 28 community engagement events in cooperation with Waterloo Regional Housing.

Significant milestones and achievements include the wrap-up of the Trillium Grow Grant, the Region of Waterloo highlighting YouthForce as an Upstream Innovation Project that aims to break the cycle of poverty and create job opportunities for youth. YouthForce has taken steps to operate as an Employment Social Enterprise year-round, entering service-based contracts with like-minded businesses and community-focused organizations.
